## Chairman's Statement

NICHOLAS NG'ANG'A CHAIRMAN



#### **KEY HIGHLIGHTS**



The global **avocado** markets are well supplied. The half-year profit closed at **Ksh 395** million compared to a half-year profit of **Ksh 951 million** posted in 2024, primarily because of a lower crop valuation in 2025.



The global macadamia market continues to show further gains, recording a half-year profit of Ksh 319 million compared to Ksh 32 million posted for the same period last year.



Our blueberry production has increased in line with expectation. This business venture is now profitable recording a half-year profit of Ksh 13 million compared to a Ksh 17 million loss for the same period last year.



Our **tea** business recorded a half-year loss of **Ksh 27.5 million** compared to a loss of **Ksh 3.5 million** last year, due to lower tea prices achieved.

#### TRADING PERFORMANCE

The year-to-date trading in our two core crops is in line with expectation. The international avocado market has been well supplied, with price levels reflecting this situation. Last year, the markets were undersupplied during the same period with a corresponding higher price. To date, Kakuzi has exported its first Pinkerton crop, early-season Hass and began its main Hass export in June. In total, 165 containers (801,840 cartons) of avocados have been exported primarily to European markets, which are also receiving fruit from Peru, South Africa and Columbia.

The earlier experienced shipping route challenges are also beginning to stabilize with an increasing number of voyages returning to the Red Sea routing.

The macadamia market is buoyant and exhibiting strong demand. Pricing has reflected this sentiment with further gains over the period, compared to last year. The half-year profits for macadamia have significantly improved, with **50%** of the anticipated production already committed for sale.

Our value-added diversification strategy is also bearing fruit, with the demand for our range of retail consumer products continuing to grow. The production of cold-pressed macadamia oil has increased, with the product proving to be very popular along with our range of ready-to-eat roasted and coated quality macadamia nuts.

Our blueberry division has posted a halfyear profit as its production volumes meets our expectations. We continue to observe increasing demand for quality blueberries, both domestically and in our key export destinations.

The Kakuzi range of sustainable forestry products remain in high demand. However, profits this half-year are lower than for the same period last year. The performance is attributable to the prevailing national economic environment, including the general building and construction slowdown.



#### DIVIDEND

The Directors do not recommend the payment of an interim Dividend.

#### **OVERVIEW & OPERATIONS**

We have experienced seasonally normal weather conditions during the first half of the year, and the irrigation dams were all filled by the plentiful rainwaters drawn from our water catchment conservation areas. In late 2024, we completed the water holding capacity enhancement project aimed at expanding our irrigation storage by a further 1 million cubic meters at our main reservoir (Nginye dam). This project is strategically important to

the Company as it helps to mitigate the impacts of climate change in future years and builds our sustainability credentials and opportunities.

Importantly, this year we have observed a stable currency and more reliable shipping into our main European export markets.

### Gnown With Purpose, Shared With Pride







Global supply into our main European markets has returned to normal levels. Peruvian volumes again dominate this market. As at the end of June, Peruvian arrivals into Europe were up some 30% on last year. Total supply into Europe is up some 17% over the previous two years. Whilst this is impacting prices, the market demand continues to grow, effectively absorbing the supply.

Demand for avocados in China and India is increasing, but is still not at a scale to replace the traditional market demand in Europe. As we stated last year, with growing production in Kenya, obtaining access to North American markets must be a priority for the Country. The North American market provides an opportunity to grow revenues and operating margins with a lower cost of sale for quality produce.

During the first half of the year, our shipping service

providers sent limited vessels through the Red Sea. Challenges remain but are showing signs of stabilization. Returning to shorter transit times of 4 to 5 weeks, down from 6 to 7 weeks is key to managing the quality of avocados arriving in our export markets.

We began the 2025 exports with our green skin variety, Pinkerton. This variety produces two crops a year, with 74 containers exported so far. Further export production is anticipated in the  $4^{\rm th}$  quarter. In early June, Hass exports commenced and will continue until early September. Our early season Hass variety, Carmen, also enjoys two fruitful seasons with 17 containers exported to Europe, India and China to date, and further exports anticipated in the  $4^{\rm th}$  quarter.





Our young orchards continue to mature and we now have 1,404 ha of macadamia plantings. By the end of June, we had completed the first season's harvest, which is traditionally 50% of the total annual crop.

Phasing sales and production is essential, to avoid over commitment of crop before it is available as processed kernel. Consequently, we have

contracted 50% of the annual crop, some 450 tons at average price c. US\$ 12 per kilo (vs US\$ 9 per Kilo in the same period last year). The balance of the crop will be sold as the year progresses and demand remains high. It is encouraging to note that selling prices continue to increase, trending up 30% from this time last year.

The impact of tariffs in the USA is naturally a concern to our operations, as this is a key market. Our marketing agents are in continuous communication with our customers to mitigate any risks which this may pose to the business.

Demand for our cold-pressed macadamia oil alongside our ready-to-eat snack range is exceptionally high. We are exploring how we can increase our market footprint whilst still preserving margins.







Our blueberry production is encouraging and has begun to positively contribute to our superfoods production strategy, complementing existing macadamia and avocado production. As of June, we have produced 42,000 kg, this year up from 8,400 kg this time last year. We anticipate that production will meet our annual field production and business revenue projections.

The market demand both domestically and in our key international markets remains strong, with prices exceeding expectations. This performance indicates that there is a good potential for further investments, in line with the Board's commitment for further diversification.

The Farm Market and Boran Barn restaurant are a well-known convenient stopover point for travelers along the north-south highway stretching from Nairobi to the Ethiopian border at Moyale. Approximately 70% of our beef production is sold through these outlets, providing quality beef with farm-to-fork credentials to our discerning customers.



The tea industry continues to suffer from overproduction, and we are beginning to see the fallout of this as some producers close their operations. Demand for tea is finite, and until Kenyan production levels rebalance in line with the market, we anticipate prices to remain subdued.





#### **COMMUNITY, COMPANY PARTNERSHIPS**

We will be publishing our sixth ESG report within the next few months, which provides a detailed overview of the work we continue to undertake in this critical area.

We continue our commitment to Environmental, Social and Governance Principles. Sustainability and regenerative agriculture practices remain at the heart of our ESG journey, and our goal has been to protect the planet, serve our communities, and meet customer demands by delivering quality products grown in the heart of Kenyan soils.

In 2024, we continued to strengthen our governance mechanisms by consistently interacting with our regulators to foster a positive relationship and meet current regulatory expectations. We therefore reaffirm our commitment to upholding the

interests of all our stakeholders through continuous innovation, progressively and prudently, to create shareholder value.

Our focus remains that being a good corporate citizen is not only the right thing to do but fundamentally is part of our DNA.





#### **STRATEGIC GOALS & DEVELOPMENTS**

The Board remains committed to continuing to diversify the Company and maintain its focus on responsible business. Our operating mandate is firmly rooted in a human rights-based approach focused on meaningful stakeholder engagement grounded in the United Nations Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights (UNGPs).

Further enhancing our shared value model is a key objective for the Company, and we are actively improving our stakeholder relations. We recognize that the Company operates in a broader ecosystem where expectations by some stakeholders will be different to our business objectives.

We continue to maintain an internationally benchmarked independent Operational Grievance Mechanism (OGM) – "SIKIKA"  as per the UNGPs global standards for mitigating and addressing human rights abuses by businesses and companies.
 All our internal and external stakeholders are encouraged to utilize SIKIKA to seek remedy to their grievances.

In turn, as a responsible corporate citizen, we also expect that our stakeholders will operate within the rule of law. In recent days, we have been faced with regrettable land invasion cases. #### **Notes**

#### 1. General information

Kakuzi Plc is incorporated in Kenya under the Kenyan Companies Act 2015 as a public limited liability company and is domiciled in Kenya.

#### 2. Basis of preparation and changes to the Group's accounting policies

#### 2.1 Basis of preparation

These interim financial statements are prepared in compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS). These interim financial statements are presented in the functional currency, Kenya Shillings (Shs), rounded to the nearest thousand, and prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the carrying of biological assets and agricultural produce at fair values less costs to sell.

These unaudited interim consolidated and company financial statements have been prepared in accordance with IAS 34 Interim Financial Reporting and should be read in conjunction with the Group's last annual consolidated and company financial statements as at and for the year ended 31 December 2024 ('last annual financial statements'). Selected explanatory notes are included to explain events and transactions that are significant for an understanding of the changes in the Group's financial position and performance since the last annual financial statements. Where necessary, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with presentation in the current year.

The Consolidated and Company statement of profit or loss and other comprehensive income are presented as one and the same since the subsidiaries are dormant and did not have any transactions during the period.

#### 2.2 Use of judgements and estimates

In preparing these interim consolidated and company financial statements, the Directors have made judgments and estimates that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets and liabilities, and income and expenses. Although these estimates are based on the Directors' best knowledge of current events and actions, actual results may ultimately differ from these estimates.

The significant judgements made by the Directors in applying the Group's accounting policies and the key sources of estimation uncertainty were the same as those described in the last annual financial statements.

#### 2.3 New standards, interpretations and amendments adopted by the Group.

The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the interim consolidated and company financial statements are consistent with those followed in the preparation of the last annual financial statements, except for the adoption of new standards effective as of 1 January 2025. The Group has not early adopted

any standard, interpretation or amendment that has been issued but is not yet effective.

Several amendments and interpretations apply for the first time in 2025, but do not have an impact on the interim condensed consolidated financial statements of the Group.

- 2.4 Costs that incur unevenly during the financial year are anticipated or deferred in the interim only if it would be also appropriate to anticipate or defer such costs at the end of the financial year.
- 2.5 Income tax expense is recognised based on the annual income tax rate expected for the full financial year. The annual tax rate used for 2025 is 30% (2024 was 30%).

#### 2.6 Comparatives

Where necessary, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation in the current year.

#### 3. Segmental reporting - Group

The Executive Directors are the operating decision makers of the Group. They make decisions based on the review of the operating segments reports.

The Group operates in two geographical areas in Kenya, Makuyu and Nandi Hills, and under several operating segments. The principal operating segments currently consist of Avocados and Macadamia whose reported sales are greater than 10% of combined sales of all operating segments and Tea and Forestry whose assets are more than 10% of combined assets of all operating segments. The business activities of livestock, joint projects and blueberries are included under "all other segments" as they relate to agricultural operations and do not meet any set criteria for individual reportable segments. There is no single customer whose revenue amounts to 10% or more of the Groups revenue.

The Group derives all revenues from contracts with customers for the transfer of goods at a point in time.

Segment assets consist primarily of property, plant and equipment, biological assets, inventories, receivables and prepayments. Unallocated assets are cash, financial assets, property, plant and equipment, and inventories relating to Main Office and Engineering Stores. Segmental liabilities consist primarily of payables and accrued expenses. Unallocated liabilities are taxes, payables, accrued expenses and non-current liabilities.
